A Year of Changes

2025 has been a year of changes:

- Move to paid dues vía Meetup
- New Membership Chair
- New Hike Scheduler Chair
- Failpoints

Dues vía Meetup

On Jan 1, 2025, GVHC changed from a paper-based/Paypal © based system of dues collection to Meetup ©.

By the end of the year, we eliminated multiple failpoints in the way the club conducted operations:

- Dues via cash / paper check
- Dues handed in vía hike leader / club officer
- Manually maintained email & contact lists
- No standard method of communication
- Club data on individual personal computers

Using Meetup to collect dues, we have:

- gone from approximately 150 to just under 500 paid members,
- eliminated multiple email & contact lists.
- Improved the reliability of membership data, and
- streamlined data analysis for trends.

Membership

It was back in 2024 the Michelle B, Membership Chair at the time, provided a well-reasoned, well-thought-out point paper to the Executive Committee on the regular issues she faced. After much research by a dedicated team of Tom K, Michelle B and Nina T, they recommended to the Exec Cmte that GVHC switch to Meetup.

The results have been outstanding.

(Note: there is a direct link to Meetup at the beginning of the newsletter for those few folks whose Meetup accounts have underlying data issues. It has been painful for them - we realize.)

Hike Scheduler

Derek P, having been a backbone of the club for years - decades, expressed his desire to move on.

We welcome Joan J and Darla C and greatly appreciate their coming forward to fill Derek's role.

Failpoints

The move to Meetup afforded us one other opportunity.

The club had multiple fail points based on our reliance on paper and archaic electronic ways of doing business.

Tom K has been working with the club officers and Chairs to move data from personal computers to a shared cloud drive with two principal goals in mind.

- Simplify planned transitions and ease the growth pains of new volunteers
- Recover quickly in the unexpected loss of a key person.





Red Creek - Genesee Valley Park

Red Creek, Rochester / Monroe County

This is a creek that flows through parts of Rochester, notably through Genesee Valley Park, and empties into the Erie Canal, just east of the Genesee River. Here's its historical context:

Natural / Pre-European Context

- The area around Genesee Valley, including where Red Creek flows, was used by Indigenous peoples, including the Seneca from the Haudenosaunee / Iroquois Nation.
- In particular, Red Creek was a point where canoes were landed. The Senecas, traveling down the Genesee River, would land at Red Creek (or slightly below) and portage over to launch canoes toward Irondequoit Creek and Lake Ontario.

Park & Urban Incorporation

- Red Creek is one of three
 waterways that intersect in Genesee
 Valley Park (the others being the
 Genesee River and the Erie Canal).
 The park was designed by
 landscape architect Frederick Law
 Olmsted and established (land
 acquired) in 1888.
- The creek has been a popular scenic spot in the park.
- With the construction of the New York State Barge Canal (which replaced parts of the Erie Canal) and other infrastructure changes, the flow of Red Creek was altered.

Modern Use & Ecology

 The creek is part of the park's trail system (Red Creek Trail) and is used for paddling & recreation. It (and the park generally) has suffered changes from infrastructure (roads, expressways, bridges, drainage, etc.) that affected its natural flow, appearance, and connectivity. Thus many landscape elements have been lost over time.
